


Ron Van Bemmel's Mustang is a bit quick for indoor flying but it does fly well.

"WOOPY"


The "WOOPY" was published in a 1960's "Aeromodeller" as a free flight model powered by a CO2 motor and David has constructed a replica for indoor flying using a mix of balsa wood and foam. The model spans 260mm and is electric powered using a single cell battery and a brushless 5000Kv motor to drive the 130mm propellor.

After some tests to determine a suitable position of the C of G the model was successfully flown at a recent Doncaster indoor meeting.


Field and clubhouse construction.




VARMS new flying site and club buildings with the flight strip on the left in the photograph.
