


# PRESIDENTS REPORT.

## **Editor's Column**

The first thing I must do is apologise for the small size of the first newsletter that I've edited, but as you can appreciate this time of the year is pretty quiet on the contest front and it is mainly the building season. Peter did a great job as editor and it will be hard to maintain the high standard.

However I'll give it my best shot.

One of the things I want to do is search out some lesser known designs from the 1930 to 1956 golden age of our great hobby of aeromodelling. I don't know about you but I'm heartily sick of an endless stream of bombers

for all occasions and events. I know they're a proven winner but so could others be if only we took the trouble to search them out and start building some of them. For instance I found two interesting designs recently which show a lot of promise. The first is Ron Warrings Skyleada "Bantam" from 1939. This 44" span design could be scaled up 48" or 50" for 1/2A or with modified rib spacing as proposed by John Whittaker enlarged to 72" or so for Duration. With it's reasonably small frontal area and RAF32 wing section it would really climb and glide. I have built one at 26.5" span for CO2 powered free flight and those of you who were at Swan Hill will remember the fantastic glide and inherent stability of this model.

The other one is the "Scarab" by Albert Hatfull. Built to 50" or thereabouts this could be a real stunner in Burford. It's as slippery as an eel, has beautiful eliptical flying surfaces and and a super airfoil. It would be a bitch to build but worth it to someone enjoys building as much as winning. Other things I want to do is run a series of profiles on the members of SAM600. How and when they started in the hobby, their achievements and humourous incidents etc. So if anyone would like to kickstart this series off, get writing and let me have it by the 1st of November. A story on the fun and games involved in building a series of replica engines may be interesting to many of our readers. If so I'll ask David Owen if he could find the time to write one for us. Remember it's your newsletter not mine and it needs input from as many people as possible to be a success, so if you have ideas, or suggestions please let me know. If you have an article to contribute send it in and I will use it. 
#### Rules.

Any Oldtimer/ Antique Aircraft, Cox reed valve 049 engine fitted with the small 5cc tank. [ as supplied with 1/2a Texaco engine.]


Flights. 3 attempts for 2 official flights. [remember it is 3 attempts to make 2 official flights, not the best 2 of 3 flights.]

Entries. I pilot per aircraft. No entry fee, 3 pilots/aircraft per team. All flights to be made on the same day. SAM U.S.A. Rules. [80z per sq. ft wing loading.]

All flights must be separate from other postal contests. No time penalties on landing. 15 min max. Good luck.
