SAM270 2cc Duration – April 6 2014, Oakford International Aeromodelling Centre.

After the disappointment of the cancellation of the Burford duration two weeks previously, it was nice to arrive at our world class flying facility to a still day and clear skies.

Taking our cue from Mother Nature, models were quickly broken out and the sound of warming engines was soon wafting across the paddock. Several check/test flights were completed successfully but Hans suffered from radio issues and was an early withdrawal. It looked grim for your editor for a while too, as the MVVS Junior glow refused to do what it had done several times successfully in the past. Much head scratching, a donated prop nut from Hans and some wise counsel from Dicko had the Czech monstrosity singing away and soon it was time for our proxy Bovell (Ian Dixon) to call proceedings to order.

True to form, the wind picked up and stayed in the 8 – 10 knot range for the rest of the day which occasionally made things interesting, however when the lift came through between 10:00 and 11:00am things really heated up. Brian Edwards, with a "Top Hat" powered by a tired OS1.5cc proved that persistence – and a little luck – pay off when he struggled to record more than 2 mins in the first 3 rounds only to max on his fourth flight! Perhaps removing the undercarriage helped a little...? A laconic Rod McDonald and his Stomper blazed a path early and his consistent performance (despite his self-deprecating grumbling) was rewarded with third place.

lan Dixon's MVVS powered "Creep" showed some excellent form once he trimmed it out and will be a solid contender in the same event in Canowindra. Perennial "Dark Horse" Rob Rowson and his Tyro powered "Zoot Suit" put in 3 Solid rounds and was a challenger for the flyoff before turning his one piece wing in to a two piece during a dutch rolling routine at the top of the climb. Bad luck Rob – but at least you got second place!

Greg McLure and his "Jasmine" annoyed everyone by not only getting a PAW 1.5 to scream like a banshee (despite it being over compressed) but actually finding lift and working it like a pro. A stewards inquiry was called for, as it was thought he must have had a ring-in, but all doping tests proved negative and we had to give him the trophy, dammit!

Several layers of skin were lost over the course of the day and the first aid box had a workout courtesy of Rob Rowson, Rod McDonald, Brian Edwards and Ian Dixon. It always seems to be the little engines that bite the hardest doesn't it? Still – at least we didn't have to take Greg to hospital this time.

After much ado, the scores after 3 rounds (4 flights, drop the worst) were tallied and the winners declared. Monsieur McLure, Rob Rowson and Rod McDonald stood on the winner's podium to soak up the accolades. Well done chaps!

Malmstrom Madness in March!

The thing that intrigues me most about free flight modelling is the pure simplicity of the concept. You build a model, start the engine, launch it and sit back to enjoy the sight of a smoothly trimmed aircraft being taken at the whim of the elements. Its all so Zen one could almost say it's a religious experience. As we all know, however, its rarely that simple and the closest we get to religion is looking up to the heavens while the aircraft disappears after failing to DT, or muttering quiet blasphemies as we pick up the pieces of our lovingly crafted model after it loops and crashes to earth after launch. There is no denying that once you get the formula right, free flight is one of the most satisfying modelling disciplines and is certainly the most pure.

In saying this, I think George Car has hit upon a winning formula with the Malmstrom Day. Simple yet quirky designs that are easy (mostly) to build, simple (mostly) to trim and easy (mostly) to fly have made this event very popular. A determined and experienced modeller can have one of these together in a couple of hours and a novice can do the same in a couple of days. Ray Malmstrom was an educator as well as an aerospace engineer/enthusiast and his designs were created in such a way that they would appeal to his students and be easy to build. While most use small diesels and glows, the advent of micro electric gear has opened up the Malmstrom design world to a whole new stream of modellers and we will probably see the event grow in participation accordingly.

While we could have wished for a sunnier day (Perth chose our Malmstrom day to break its 6 month drought) the wind was still and the passing showers didn't dampen our enthusiasm. It was a return to a traditional paddock meet, with cars parked in line, boots open to the elements and chairs lined up for spectators to take in the spectacle.



George managed to get his rubber model circling well; Chris Edwards and his 150% push up were stymied by a poor cg position and he couldn't remove enough nose weight from the model to get it flying - still, we did envy the \$250 "Eagle" book he picked up at a flea market for \$10! (bargain of the century!!)

By the time the "Mass Launch" was at hand, the wind and the rain was starting to make a greater impact and the "Mass Launch" turned in to a "Mass Crash" with only two of the seven participants getting in to the air at the anointed hour. Ian Dixon and Mike Butcher were the most consistent of the i.c brigade but it was Mike's amazing little "Mimi" that brought the most smiles to his – and everyone else's – face. He was crowned the winner of the "Stainless Tea Cup" for 2014 – and quite deservedly!

(long pause)


Tower: Roger XXX, hold your position. Deer on runway NN cleared for immediate departure.

(Two seconds, and then--I presume by coincidence--the deer bolts from the runway, and runs back into the woods.)


Tower: Cessna XXX cleared for departure, runway NN. Caution wake turbulence, departing deer.




